# **Building Services & Meeting Needs of Youth:**

## YCC's NEW Day Resource Program

In September, the Youth Crisis Center, Inc. began the adventure of providing new services to help youth in Natrona County achieve success. Youth who cannot attend school during the day or who are enrolled in online schooling will receive education, social/emotional groups, support group, art therapy, Cowboy Ethics, family support services, and access to additional support and referrals!



# What is the day resource program?

The day resource program is a brand new program that provides educational and behavioral health supports to youth 6th-12th grade when they cannot be in school during the day.

#### Who can attend?

Currently the Day Resource Program is open to youth in our crisis shelter or group home who are not able to attend traditional school day setting.

#### What is so great about a day resource program?

The purpose of this program is to assist youth with academic success by supporting their educational development and teaching them coping skills, problem solving, emotional regulation, and other supportive skills that can help them maintain in school and better manage the challenges they are facing. Together with the Natrona County School District, we will work with youth to help them return to school successfully and with as little academic disruption as possible.

#### What is next for the day resource program?

Over the next year, we hope to expand services to meet the needs of youth throughout the community. As we expand services, we hope to provide this program to youth who are not enrolled in our crisis shelter or group home, helping even more youth and families find success!

# Grief, Loss, & Separation Group

This year we started a brand new service for youth in the center: Grief, Loss, and Separation Group. In this group, youth are learning about grief as a natural reaction to loss and how it is normal to feel overwhelmed with emotion. Coping with loss can be one of the most challenging things we encounter in life. If we take a moment to stop and reflect on our lives, we often realize we experience loss much more often than we think. Many of the youth we serve at YCC have experienced repetitive loss. The first time we met, the group came up with more than 20 different types of loss! And in group youth have been able to connect some of the emotions they feel around that loss such as anger, numbness, emptiness, and powerlessness.

To help the youth understand the impact of loss, one activity included cutting out words and pictures from magazines and then making a group collage. This activity really pointed out how relationships often break down during grief, loss, and separation. Youth identified this may be due to loss of trust, divorce, and death. One youth identified grieving the loss of a relationship he never had but wished that he had.

During group, youth build and practice empathy with each other as they share their experiences and hear about other's



experiences. One of the best parts of this group is when the youth learn from one another. They have taught each other new coping skills and helped each other identify losses they may not have even been aware of. We look forward to continuing to provide this group and help youth learn to cope with their grief, loss, and separation.
